



District Governor C.W. "Buzz" Goins

It's beyond the first week in August, and the first Council of Governor's meeting in Kerrville is history. The sixth-largest number of campers was served this year. There are still spaces going to waste! Now is the time to start looking for campers.

The International President, Ashok Mehta and his wife, Kokila, visited the camp on Friday and Saturday. He was lavish in his praise for the accomplishments of the Lions of Texas. In route to the camp, they toured the Eye Research facility and the Lion's Low Vision Center in San Antonio. As a young man and before he became a Lion, Ashok worked at some of the eye care camps in India. Seeing what could be accomplished was the impetus for his joining the Lions.

There was the opportunity for everyone to have as much "face time" with the President as they wished. I had a conversation with him about our need for a District Convention speaker taking care to note that I would not presume to impose on his full schedule. My approach was to point out that the greater Houston area is home to 80 to 100 thousand Indians and very, very few of them are Lions. This he knew, and did not rule-out himself as the speaker. We discussed Mr. A.P. Singh, International Director as an alternative. Singh is an imposing figure and a gifted speaker. I await the phone call. In either case, this will be a coup for District 2-S2.

The District Governors and Vice District Governors hosted a luncheon for the International President and his wife, and they were the guests of honor at the PDG Banquet on Saturday night. On the President's message one last thought, his Plus 1 Concept is simple and very viable. Remember, "One new member per club and one new club per district." is an increase of more than fifty thousand new members! Retention is an important part of this program. Do not forget the new rule, woe be upon the club president that drops members without first informing Judy Champion the Retention Chairman who is not in the least appalled at the sight of fresh blood.

Switching gears, Jimmy Ross, 1st VP will be the incoming president in New Orleans next July.

His elevation from Director to 2nd VP in Detroit is still a topic of conversation among Lions throughout the world. Before this event, Texans were thought to be "over the top", now they are known to be far beyond the top, which means we have to exceed the spectacle of Detroit. Our reputation seems to grow on an exponential scale; e.g., At the convention in Hong Kong, a Brit from Wales asked me if it was true that a bottle Scotch (donated by a British Lion), was auctioned-off for \$3,000.00 at a Lions function (see last August's VDG Report). I told him that he had been victimized by idle rumor and gossip, and in fact, the actual "final price" was \$3,400.00. This wiped the quickly growing "I knew it." grin from his face. I can't wait to tell him that the "Scotch auction" this year netted \$4,500.00. Like his predecessor, President Mehta looked on in disbelief. I digress. More to the point, to make Jimmy's coronation worthy of Texans (and for the edification of the universe), we need \$45.00 from every club in District 2-S2.

THE LIONS OF 2-S2 ARE "GOING TO THE DOGS"!

Actually, \$1 of our 100% donations will be going to the dogs, the *Canine Companions for Independence*. When you make your donation, this is what your dollar is going to do:

- It will help train Service Dogs. A Service Dog is partnered with an adult who is disabled but who has the physical ability to work independently with a dog. The Service Dog is trained to perform important tasks specifically designed to enhance the independence of its partner. For example, a Service Dog can pull their disabled partner in a manual wheel chair, flip light switches on an off, push buttons for elevators or automatic doors, open refrigerator doors, retrieve dropped items and many other tasks specific to their partner's needs.
- It will help train Hearing Dogs. Hearing Dogs work with adults who are deaf or hard of hearing and are trained to alert their partners to key sounds by making physical contact with their partner. They are trained to recognize and respond to the ring of a doorbell, the cry of a baby, a knock at the door, a kitchen timer, an alarm clock, an intruder, a smoke alarm, even someone calling a name. A Hearing Dog is also trained to indicate the source of the sound.
- It will help train Skilled Companion Dogs. Skilled Companion Dogs are trained to work with an adult or child with a disability under the guidance of a facilitator. The facilitator is typically a care-giver, a spouse, or a parent, who handles and cares for the assistance dog and facilitates the success of a primary human-canine partnership. Both the recipient and the facilitator are trained to learn dog handling skills and how to work as a team. Skilled Companion Dogs can perform tasks like retrieving dropped items, open and close doors, and many other tasks common to everyday living. With this kind of assistance, recipients can rely more on their trained canine and less on other people.
- It will help train Facility Dogs. A Facility Dog is trained to work with a facilitator-handler who is able-bodied and who works or volunteers in settings such as hospitals, extended care facilities, physical therapy programs, hospices, special education classrooms, and programs for people with developmental disabilities. Facility Dogs are trained to perform many tasks that arise in the types of facilities mentioned above. The most valued quality, however, is the unconditional love and attention it gives to the patients with whom it interacts. For a person in recovery or in extended care, the mere presence of a friendly, safe, attentive dog can be an uplifting experience.

Canine Companions was founded in 1975 in Santa Rosa, California. Over 2100 Canine Companions have graduated since that time. There are over 200 candidates on the waiting list for canine companions.

The mission statement for *Canine Companions for Independence* is "to enhance the lives of people with disabilities by providing highly trained assistance dogs and ongoing support to ensure quality partnership. Their website is www.caninecompanions.org or info@caninecompanions.org.



GOING, GOING, GOING – UP, UP, UP!



As we produce more of our own oil, we need to

improve our ability to refine it into gasoline. To meet our growing demand for gasoline America now imports more than a million barrels of fully refined gasoline every day. That means one of every nine gallons of gas you get in your pump is refined in a foreign country. The Environmental Protection Agency is simplifying rules and regulations for refinery expansion.

Diesel engine technology has also progressed dramatically in the past few decades. Many Americans remember the diesel cars of the 1970's. They made a lot of noise and they spewed a lot of black smoke. Advances in technology and new rules have allowed us to leave those days of diesel behind. Our clean diesel rules will reduce air pollution from diesel engines by about 90% and reduce the sulfur content of diesel fuel by more than 95 percent.

A step toward making America less dependent on foreign oil is to develop new alternatives for gasoline and diesel. - using soybean oil to produce a clean burning fuel - making fuel from waste products like recycled cooking grease. Bio-diesel can be used in any vehicle that runs on regular diesel, and delivers critical environmental and economic benefits.

Bio-diesel burns more completely and produces less air pollution than gasoline or regular diesel. Bio-diesel also reduces engine wear, and produces almost no sulfur emissions, which makes it a good choice for cities and states working to meet strict air quality standards. And every time we use home grown Bio-diesel, we support American farmers, not foreign oil producers.

In the past three years more than 300 public fueling stations have started offering Bio-diesel. You're beginning to see a new industry evolve. And as more Americans choose Bio-diesel over petroleum fuel, they can be proud in knowing they're helping to make this country less dependent on foreign oil. More Americans are realizing the benefits of Bio-diesel every year.

Another important alternative fuel is ethanol. Ethanol comes from corn, and it can be mixed with gasoline to produce a clean, efficient fuel. In low concentrations, ethanol can be used in any vehicle. And with minor modifications, vehicles can run on fuel blend that includes 85% ethanol and only 15% gasoline.

Like Bio-diesel, ethanol helps communities to meet clean air standards, farmers to fine new markets for their products, and America to replace foreign crude oil with a new renewable source grown right here in the nations heartland. Together, ethanol and Bio-diesel present a tremendous opportunity go diversify our supply of fuel for cars and buses and trucks and heavy-duty vehicles.

A recent study by Oak Ridge National Laboratory projected that bio-fuels, such as ethanol and Bio-diesel could provide about a fifth of America's transportation fuel within 25 years. And that would be good for our kids.
