Katrina, the lady with an attitude; she's gone, but her evil lives on.

Since 10 September 2005, the Lions have manned a Eye Screening position in the medical services facility for the displaced persons at Reliant Arena. After an inauspicious start, we are now profusely thanked by the people we are serving as well as the hierarchy of the medical groups with which we are associated. Putting eyeglasses on

those who really need them is truly a "feel good" experience. From Saturday thru Wednesday, 523 pairs of glasses have been fitted and an additional 60 people or so have been afforded eye care services. The current operation is scheduled to shut down at midnight Thursday, 15 September 2005, and this will end our current association with the University of Houston, Baylor College of Medicine and the University of Texas at the Reliant Arena and the George R. Brown Convention Center. The next phase will be the most difficult as we will be on our own with the Eye Screening Trailer. We will not have the steady guidance of PID Marshall Cooper, PDGs Ike Fitzgerald, Carolyn Keskitalo, Jim Jones, Claude Durham, Glynn Kaigler, VDG Buz Sawyer, Lions Irma Dowden, Loretta Dock, Wendy Youngblood, and a friend of the Lions, Melinda Whitfill. These individuals are from other districts and showed us the way, and for this, we will forever be indebted.

One good thing about Lionism is that when one door closes another opens. Literally, hundreds if not thousands, of the displaced persons still need glasses, and we are one of the sources. The problem is that we must now find our clients. We have a mechanism thru the Harris County Clinics system, responsible for their continuing medical care, to "track" them and stage them for the needed eye screening services at a planed time and date. This will be the implementation of a district level project on which all clubs can participate. First, we train (eight to twelve hours) approximately 25 District Lions on the operation of the equipment used in eye screening. Next, we have the individual club to schedule an event in their area. The Eye Screening Trailer will be taken to the event area with 6-8 team members who will provide the services. This is the basic plan with several details to be ironed out. When the Katrina effort is at minimal effort, a Cabinet Committee will be established and the plan will be pursued.

We are looking for volunteers to be trained, and we are looking for committee members to administer and oversee the project. If you wish to serve in an area where few Lions have the opportunity to participate, this is your project.

My personal **THANKS** to those mentioned above, and to those mentioned below, I am very proud to serve you. You answered the call without reservation or hesitation: **WE SERVE** now has a greater meaning.

Have you ever wondered why Lions World Services for the Blind, owned by the Arkansas Lions, receives \$1 of our 100% contributions and is one of our "pass through" charities? I wondered.....

I wondered why, because we have so many worthwhile charities here in Houston and here in Texas. I wondered because we have the Lighthouse of Houston. This is what I found out...............

Lions World Services for the Blind (LWSB) is located in Little Rock, Arkansas. Their mission statement says that they will provide training to blind and visually impaired persons from across the United States and even foreign countries. The majority of their trainees come from those states that adjoin Arkansas. The trainees are sent by State Agencies from those states. As an example, last year 23 blind or visually impaired persons from Texas were sent to LWSB by the Texas Commission for the Blind.

The cost for the training was \$105,800. LWSB was reimbursed by the sending agency in the amount of \$82,800, which leaves a deficit of \$23,000. This deficit is made up by contributions from the Lions of Texas. Of the 23 persons who attended last year, three were from the Harris county* area. Their training cost was \$13,800; the State reimbursed LWSB \$10,800 and the Lions of 2-S2 contributed approximately \$1900. Our district benefited by \$1600 from other districts in Texas last year (but, of course, that is not always the case).

Why does the Texas Commission for the Blind sometimes choose LWSB over the Lighthouse of Houston? Because each of their programs are different and the training is based on the type of needs of the blind or visually impaired attendee.

Why does the Texas Commission for the Blind not pay the entire \$4600 cost? It works pretty much like HMOs, Medical Insurance Companies, or Medicare. A cost is established and that is what is paid, regardless of the real cost. Surprised?

Like any charitable organization (like our own Texas Lions Camp), money is always short.....there never seems to be enough to go around. But, I am glad that in a small way, we are able to help "pay the way" of those blind and visually impaired persons from our area and Texas who attend LWSB.

Presidents and Secretaries Meeting

September 7, 2005

DG Buzz stressed the importance of Lions being involved with the hurricane Katrina relief efforts. For Lions, this would be helping with vision screening and distributing used glasses to those in need.

DG Buzz introduced PDG George Conner (Katrina Relief) and PDG Irv Wishnow. There is a need for 20 volunteers to help with the vision screening at the GRB. The Lions will furnish 3+ vans with the equipment for eye exams, and 40,00 pairs of used eye glasses to be matched to the needs of the evacuees. The Lions will be working with the optometrists from the University of Houston and their local organizations. The ophthalmologists from the Ophthalmology Society of Houston will also be helping. Those who want to volunteer, Lion Agnes Sullivan (Houston Spring Branch) is the volunteer coordinator for this project. Lions, wear your vest!!

Leadership Link

Periodically throughout the Lions year, I will be sharing thoughts and information regarding leadership in Lionism, our district, or our clubs. This month's "Leadership Link" kicks off the initiative with some thoughts on how ALL Lions can be leaders in their clubs. Remember, our district is only as strong as the weakest link, and in this case, the weakest club. We don't want ANY of our clubs to struggle as a weak link, and I offer these thoughts to you this month on how club members can be leaders to strengthen their clubs.

L is for "Learn all you can about Lionism." Attend trainings, read publications, dive into the various websites available to you, and talk to experienced Lions about what Lionism is and how you can be a part of it.

E is for "Extend an invitation to a guest to visit your club." You never know ... a friend or colleague may not be comfortable with a direct invitation to join Lions Club, but might accept an invitation to join you for lunch or dinner at your club meeting. Start them out as guests, and they will develop into prospective members after they see how much fun you have at your meeting and how much you contribute to the community!

A is for "Attend club meetings, club activities, and 2-S2 events." Make it a point to attend club meetings – don't be a mailbox member who sends in dues but never shows up. If your club has committed to an activity, project or outing, take part in it. Mark your calendars for the important district events: the mid-winter conference in January and the district convention in the spring. These dates are set well in advance, so you will be able to plan accordingly and attend.

D is for "Do your part to make your club successful." What do you have to offer your club? There are lots of ways to contribute to your club, so pinpoint your talents and match them to the needs of your club...and,

E is for "Expect the same from all members." Don't let anyone stay on the fringes of your club. Everyone can do something, new members or charter members, so set the expectation that everyone in the club will contribute something, no matter how small, to help things run smoothly.

R is for "Read the 2-S2 newsletter and Lion magazine." There is lots of good information to be found in both publications, and reading them regularly will help you stay informed and involved!!

S is for "Stick to the principle of service." Make sure everything you do in the name of Lionism is connected back to the idea of "service." Be brave and question practices or decisions made that don't directly link to our motto.

H is for "Help make the president's vision a reality." Each club president has a vision or goal for his/her year as president, even if it hasn't yet been verbalized. Have a conversation with your club president to find out what he/she would like to see as a result of serving as club president, and help make that happen.

I is for "Initiate a project or activity and enlist club members' help." What can you initiate? How about a club retreat, a service project, a fundraiser, or a holiday celebration for those in need? Create a website for your club, publish a newsletter, start a new tradition at your club meeting, or plan a party/social gathering for members and their families. Don't just suggest a project – initiate it!

P is for "Partner with less-experienced Lions and take time to mentor them and motivate them." Nothing will make a greater impact on new Lions – show them you care. Make sure they know you are glad that they have joined the best service organization in the world. Make them feel welcome, and if you are a sponsoring Lion, follow through with your new Lion at least for the first year of membership. Sit with them at meetings, explain what's going on, and call them before the meeting to make sure they are able to attend. It's all about making folks feel they 'belong,' and if they do, they'll stick around and become excellent Lions in no time!

PROGRESS REPORT

DISTRICT 2-S2 LIONS EYELGLASSES FOR KATRINA EVACUEES PROJECT

Twenty-five Lions and friends from District 2-S2 have worked on the Lions Eyeglasses for Katrina Evacuees Project so far. Most have been at Reliant Center, some were at George R. Brown Convention Center. Eleven more Lions from as far away as Lubbock and Midland helped on the project. Lions are assisting optometrists and ophthalmologists who make the eye examinations and write prescriptions for eyeglasses.

Three Lions' trailers with vision screening equipment and used eyeglasses were brought from Midland, Corpus Christi and Livingston. Lions vision screening equipment was used at Reliant Center, where the eye clinic is now closed, and is being used at GRB where the effort continues.

Over 200 pairs of used eyeglasses were given to evacuees at Reliant Center last Saturday and Sunday. Lens Crafters provided new eyeglasses, made on site, at GRB starting last week. Wal Mart provided new eyeglasses at Reliant Center from Monday, September 12 through Thursday, September 15, when the Reliant Center operation was closed. Approvimately 100 pairs of eyeglasses have been given away each day at Reliant. I was told that 201 patients were served at GRB today, and that the count has been high there all week.

Lion volunteers have gotten well deserved praise from the medical community, the Harris County Hospital District and others. Lions have, indeed, done an outstanding job. Many Lions worked several shifts to fill the need.

Lion Eddie Thatcher from the Cut & Shoot Family Lions Club deserves special praise. Lion Eddie was at Reliant Center every day from Saturday through Thursday, running vision screening machines and assisting wherever needed.

District 2-S2 will carry on this program for as long as the evacuees need our help. More volunteers are needed to learn the vision screening routine. On the job training with a knowleable Lion, such as Eddie is as good as going through formal training. Do not hold back from volunteering if you have not been trained. Many Lions are now qualified to show you how it is done.

District 2-S2 now has one of the Lions Eye Bank of Texas trailers, complete with vision screening equipment and a supply of used eyeglasses. We plan to take this trailer to locations where we find groups of evacuees who need eyeglasses. Today, I received TSO vouchers that will cover the cost of examinations and eyeglasses for hurricane Katrina evacuees. Lions club presidents are now authorized to sign and issue these vouchers. Please call me at 713-664-4073 or e mail me at gconner@sbcglobal.net, and I will send you the vouchers you need.

Since I got home this evening (Thursday), I learned that the eye clinic will continue at GRB. At 9:25 p.m., I received a telephone call from Dr. Amy Coburn requesting Lions' assistance at GRB tomorrow, Saturday, Sunday and Monday through Friday of next week. Lion Agnes Sullivan will put out the call volunteers to fill the shifts now scheduled for GRB. Don't be shy about calling her to volunteer. Her telephone numbers are 713-464-7170 at home, 713-789-4323 at work and 713-416-6936 cellular. Her e mail address is ASullivanHouston@aol.com.

The rewards from this work are great! The people we serve truly appreciate getting new eyeglasses.



Even if people stopped pumping out carbon dioxide and other pollutants tomorrow, global warming would still get worse, according to researchers.

Sea levels will rise more, worsening the damage caused by extreme high tides and storm surges, and droughts, heat waves and storms will become more severe - climate experts predict.

That makes immediate action to slow global warming even more vital.

Even if we stabilize greenhouse gas concentrations, the climate will continue to warm, and there will be proportionately even more sea level rise. The longer we wait, the more climate changes we are committed to in the future.

Virtually no one disagrees human activity is fueling global warming, and a global treaty signed in Kyoto, Japan aims to reduce polluting emissions. But the world's biggest polluter, the United States, has withdrawn from the 1997 treaty, saying its provisions would hurt the U.S. economy.

Computer simulations of climate change that took months to run on supercomputers - including as many variables as researchers could think of, such as human carbon emissions, other pollution, emissions from volcanoes, changes in solar radiation and shifts in the ozone layer, were run.

One scenario assumed human production of carbon dioxide and other so-called greenhouse gases stabilized in 2000 and ran the model to the year 2100.

They found that just based on the ingredients that have already been put into the atmosphere in the 20th century, we already are committed to another half a degree of global warming.

Experts say sea levels have risen 4 inches already over the past century and could rise between 4 and 40 inches more in the next century.

If completely melted, the Greenland ice sheet would add 25 feet to overall sea level and the West Antarctic Ice Sheet would raise it by 16 feet — enough to swamp most of Florida, Bangladesh and New York City's Manhattan island.

In a second study in Science, a much simpler climate model was used to make a similar prediction. Even if emissions stopped now, it calculated, sea levels would still rise by 4 inches per century.
