

Why are we quick to judge our fellow man when the God we serve does not judge us until after we are dead?

The Mid Winter Lions Leadership Conference (MWLLC) is set for Saturday, 22 January 2005 at the Conroe Lone Star Convention Center.

The emphasis will be on training. A wide range of programs will be offered and will include Club Officers Training (all offices), Leadership Training for all Lions who are and who aspire to be successful club officers, Retention Training which answers the question, "Why does my club lose members?" Interestingly enough, at the USA/Canada Forum a factoid was given that caused quite a stir until it was dissected and analyzed. A wide ranging survey showed that 82% of the "lost membership" left because of "long and boring meetings". I challenge all former and current club officers to consider this statement for a glint of relevance at your club. If you find the truth or a scintilla of doubt, run do not walk to the MWLLC to rectify the problem before the members come to the same conclusion you did. The simple truth is that you are not doing a credible job, and ignorance, contrary to common belief, is an excuse - until you have been told or offered the opportunity to be educated. LIONS DISTRICT 2-S2 2004-2005

DIABETES AWARENESS ESSAY CONTEST "PEOPLE WITH DIABETES TREATED WITH DIET ONLY ARE POORLY MONITORED"

The essay should analyze the problem and present a solution. Research for this topic can be conducted by interviewing school officials, teachers, doctors, nurses, paramedics/emt's, other medical professionals, diabetes research organizations, diabetes patients, and the inter-net and by using the library. The topic allows the contestant considerable lead way in proposing a plan. Sources of data and quotes should be identified by title and date published (year if known). Innovative, practical and reasonable ideas are welcomed. Each contestant must be a full time student at a public school or comparable educational program of learning at the junior or senior level, within the area designated as District 2-S2 in Texas Lions Clubs districts.

The Diabetic Essay shall be a written article to be read by the contestant/author at the District 2-S2 Contest on March 5, 2005. A written copy should be sent along with the Application.

The essay shall not exceed 1500 words. All words in the essay are counted including articles, conjunctives and pronouns, for example, i.e., "a," "I," "the," "and," and "an."

In addition to the copies used by the contestant in the reading of the essay, each contestant submits four (4) double-spaced, typewritten copies of the contest essay at the time the article is read.

Each contestant must personally research, write and read the contest essay and present it before judges and spectators. The essay must include a bibliography of sources used in its composition.

Two or more of the judges should be knowledgeable about the medical aspects of diabetes; one or more should be an educator knowledgeable about English grammar, sentence structure, pronunciation and its correct usage.

The following are the criteria used for judging essays:

- 1. Sixty percent currentness, authenticity and application to the assigned Essay Topic.
- 2. Fifteen percent grammar, sentence structure, pronunciation, enunciation, correct word usage, and relationship to the assigned Essay.
- 3. Twenty-five percent understandability of the essay through personal presentation techniques in use of posture, eye contact and voice by its modulation, volume, speed, clarity, and enunciation.

No one will be allowed to enter during an essay reading nor leave until judges have finished scoring the contestant. All contestants may visit the stage area, be shown the area of mike pick-up, test voice on mike for sound level and be allowed to ask questions concerning the contest, the contestant's area, procedures, grading scorecards, etc.

Contestants will draw for positions and remain outside the contest area until invited to ender by the Contest Chairperson. Contestants will not give any self-introduction but give the title of their essay and then proceed with the reading. The audience should be informed before the first contestant to not applaud at the end of the essay. Contestants may remain to hear following essays.

When all essays have been presented, contestants assemble in the order of their presentations to state their names, hometowns, ages, schools, grade levels, and LIONS club sponsors. At the end of this process, the audience may collectively appliand all contestants.

Persons involved in the conduct of the contest, parents, chaperones, and guests of the contestants, may be introduced.

The winner will receive a Scholar/Grant of \$500.00 from the District. PROPOSED AMENDMENT LIONS DISTRICT 2-S2 CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAYS

Since the last dues increase for Lions District 2-S2 in 1997

- Costs for printing, postage and supplies continue to increase.
- The District has had to cut expenses for membership development and travel for the Vice District Governor.
- The membership in Lions District 2-S2 has dropped by more than 450 members.

Currently, there is an extreme need for funds

- To cover the ongoing expenses of the District Administration, such as postage, printing and office supplies.
- To provide reasonable reimbursement of Vice District Governor Expenses
- To develop members recruiting materials and Club Extension expenses.
- To provide a fund for a Digital Projector and other equipment to benefit Leadership Development, Club Extension and Public Relations.

Article X, Section 2 – District Administration Fund, Subsection (a)

Currently reads:

"To provide a District Administrative Fund, a semi-annual per capita tax in the Amount of \$8.50 annually (\$4.25 semi-annually) shall be levied on each Member thereof. Said tax shall be remitted by each club in the District to the Cabinet Treasurer as hereinafter provided.

Proposed to read as follows:

"To provide a District Administrative Fund, a semi-annual per capita tax in the Amount of \$10.50 annually (\$5.25 semi-annually) shall be levied on each

Member thereof. Said tax shall be remitted by each club in the District to the Cabinet Treasurer as hereinafter provided."

Adoption of this proposed amendmentwill require a 2/3rd's approval of the Certified Delegates to the 2005 District Convention. If approved the change will be effective July 1, 2005.



25 CHEAP WAYS TO KEEP YOUR HOUSE COOLER

Air Conditioning

- •Open windows and use portable or ceiling fans instead of operating air conditioner. Even mild air movement of 1 mph can make it feel four degrees cooler.
- •Use a fan with your window air conditioner to spread the cool air in your home.
- •Use a programmable thermostat with your air conditioner to adjust setting at night or when no one is home.
- •Don't place lamps or TVs near your air conditioner thermostat; heat from these appliances will cause the air conditioner to run longer.
- •Consider installing a whole house fan or evaporative cooler (a "swamp cooler") if appropriate for your climate.
- •Install white window shades, drapes or blinds to reflect heat. Install awnings on south-facing windows.
- •Close curtains on south and west-facing windows during the day.
- •Install sun-control or other reflective film to south facing windows

Landscaping a cooler house

- •Plant trees or shrubs to shade air conditioning units, but do not block the airflow.
- •Grown on trellises, vines such as ivy or grapevines can shade the whole side of a house.
- •Avoid landscaping with lots of unshaded rock, cement or asphalt on south or west sides.
- •Deciduous trees planted on the south and west sides will keep walls cool in the summer. Just 3 trees, properly placed around the house can save between \$100 and \$250 annually in cooling cost.

Air temperatures can be 3 to 6 degrees cooler in tree-shaded neighborhoods.

Little things mean a lot

- •Replace incandescent bulbs with compact fluorescents.
- •Air dry dishes instead of using your dishwasher's drying cycle.
- •Use a microwave oven instead of a conventional electric range.
- •Turn off your computer and monitor when not in use.
- •Unplug appliances when not in use to prevent them from using "standby" energy.
- •Lower the thermostat on your hot water heater, 1150 in comfortable for most uses.
- •Take showers instead of baths to reduce hot water use.
- •Wash only full loads of dishes and clothes.
- •Make it a habit to turn off the lights before you leave a room.
- •Install motion sensors on your outdoor lights, rather than leaving them on all night.
- •Caulking and weather-stripping will keep cool air in during the summer.
- •If you see holes or separated joints in your ducts, hire a professional to repair them.
- •Add insulation around air conditioning ducts when they are located in unconditioned spaces such as attics, crawl spaces and garages.
- •Check to see that your fireplace damper is closed.
